Welcome to 2024! Our excitement starts early this year with the International Silverstick Mooretown U21 finals starting on January 4. See you there!

It's hard to believe 2023 has come and gone, but it was a prosperous year for St. Clair Township. I'm looking forward to my second year as your Mayor.

There are many exciting projects on the go this year, with the first being the new club house construction at our golf course. It will benefit all residents and participants and create a welcoming first impression for newcomers.

We have some complex road upgrades and bridge work coming up, but these are things that keep our infrastructure strong to attract new businesses and residents to our community. Be sure to watch for traffic slowdowns and detours if they are needed.

This year, we need to keep the pressure on our senior government to acquire financial assistance through grants and programs that will help us fund our wastewater treatment plant addition. The plant expansion will increase the capacity we need to carry us forward for several years to come.

Winter Parking By-Law

In accordance with St. Clair Township By-Law 5 of 2022, as of Dec. 1, it is against the law to leave vehicles of any kind, whether licensed or unlicensed, parked overnight from 1 a.m. to 7 a.m. on public roads or streets. They must be kept clear to allow the unimpeded passage of snow or any winter control operation con-

They must be kept clear to allow the unimpeded passage of snow or any winter control operation conducted by municipal forces or contractors. The bylaw will be in effect until April 1, 2024. It includes: camping trailers, commercial trailers, derelict vehicles, marine vehicles, and recreational trailers. All obstructions, including basketball nets and garbage cans, must also be kept off the streets.

Residents are reminded it is against the law (Highway Traffic Act) to shovel snow from driveways and sidewalks out onto public streets. These snow piles create dangerous obstacles that can contribute to needless automobile collisions and the loss of control of a vehicle.





Pheasant/rabbit hunting licenses

The Township of St. Clair pheasant/rabbit hunting licences are now on sale. They will be available at the following locations: Corunna Home Hardware, Corunna; Brigden Feed Mill; and St. Clair Civic Centre, Mooretown. The fees will be \$5.00 for a resident license and \$8.00 for a nonresident license. They will be on sale until Feb. 28, 2024. Applicants must apply in person and multiple licenses will not be issued.

Township receives funding to renew critical infrastructure

St. Clair Township has received \$2,732,643.00 in Ontario Community Infrastructure Funding (OCIF) is part of the Ontario government's \$12,437,989 invest-

part of the Ontario government's \$12,437,989 invest-ment to help renew and rehabilitate critical infra-structure in Sarnia-Lambton. The goal of the funding is to support economic growth and job creation. "OCIF provides funding to eligible communities eve-ry year to help them address critical infrastructure needs, including road, bridge, water and wastewater projects," said Sarnia-Lambton MPP Bob Bailey. OCIF infrastructure funding helps support projects in communities with populations under 100 000 communities with populations under 100,000.

Solution to "crisis" in child care sought Lambton County council has directed staff to look into, and report on, the current status of child care in Lambton county in response to a 2024-2028 Master Plan that might improve access to available child care spaces. A report based on the current availabilcare spaces. A report based on the current availabil-ity of spaces, current funding for them, and steps that could be taken to remedy any shortfalls, will be presented to County Council before its 2024 budget deliberations, then sent to all local Municipal Coun-cils for review and feedback by Jan. 31, 2024. It is hoped the process will lead to solutions.

A presentation to County Council by the Petrolia Childcare Advocacy Group described the shortage of suitable, well-qualified child care spaces as a "child care crisis".

Presentation suggests library consolidation Lambton County Library representatives Andrew Meyer and Darlene Coke attended council to speak on the recommendations that had come to light as the result of the 2022 Joint Library Facilities Review. A recommendation regarding the Sombra library suggested the library foot-print be expanded or the building be demolished and re-

built. (The Sombra Library is currently situated in the former Sombra Township municipal office.)

With Sombra Daycare ready to leave their part of the building, the library could expand into the abandoned area. Deputy Mayor Steve Miller commented that the two libraries had served their respective communities well and some people without transportation would find it difficult to access the single facility.



SLEP plays active role in announcement of underground CO2 storage



In Oil Springs on Dec. 13, Graydon Smith, Minister of Natural Resources and Forestry, announced the Ontario government is taking steps to encourage innovation and reduce emissions by enabling industries to begin testing and demonstrating small-scale underground *carbon storage projects on private land.

Sarnia-Lambton Economic Partnership's (SLEP) long-term advocacy efforts will encourage regulation changes enabling and permitting geological carbon sequestration on private land within Ontario. This process will have major economic impacts on local industry and their efforts to decarbonize, eventually achieving their net zero goals. It also represents an economic opportunity for capital investment and innovation in the low-carbon hydrogen industry.

The announcement follows SLEP's visit to Queen's Park in September 2023, facilitated in part by MPP Bob Bailey in support of Sarnia-Lambton and local industry. During their time at Queen's Park, CEO Dan Taylor and Economic Development Officer Shauna Carr, alongside partners from the Sarnia Energy and Chemistry Committee, the Sarnia-Lambton Chamber of Commerce, Enbridge, and Imperial Oil, met with Minister Smith to discuss carbon capture utilization and storage.

"It is meaningful that Minister Smith chose to make this announcement in Sarnia-Lambton at the Oil Museum of

Canada as this represents another exciting step in our energy history as we transition toward net zero," said Dan Taylor, CEO, SLEP. "The Economic Partnership will continue our advocacy efforts and actively seek out permissive regulatory changes and expedited clarity to support local decarbonization and investment in our energy and chemistry industries; and to support Ontario's Hydrogen Hub."

Work is underway on a framework to allow the development of large commercial projects. Public consultations are scheduled to begin in 2024.

The Sarnia-Lambton Economic Partnership (SLEP) is the lead economic development agency for the Sarnia-Lambton area. It focuses on promoting the distinct advantages that Sarnia-Lambton offers companies and residents. 



# New Sombra mural fulfills a man's dream of past and future

And at the same time, he wanted the location to stand out and be something everyone could be proud of. He also wanted to make a place that could bring people together over coffee and great food. When the Riverview Restaurant closed, he

bought it and worked to transform the building. Krista explained, "With his artistic eye, he saw the North was as a potential artist's canvas. A big 'welcome' that could be one of the first things people see as they come into our community.

During the dedication of the mural, Krista explained what each of the design elements represented.

The giant man picking up a corn stalk was dubbed, "Gus", an everyman figure who loves the land, works hard and is passionate about his community.

The historic river scene with the boat, the "Miss America" and the fisherman in the foreground represent how we are all tethered to the river, it's mood and it's beauty.

The Hotel St. Clair at the far end of the mural was not well known in the community but was a busy place in the days when Sombra was booming.

Krista admits the sandpiper shown picking at the ground was her idea. Sandpipers were frequent visitor to the place where the Klompstras lived and Matt seemed to have a connection with them. Krista believe the sandpiper was Matt's spirit bird because its attributes are quite similar to his.

### SCRCA Seeking Landowners interested in Tree Planting and Stewardship Projects

Stewardship and tree planting specialists at the St. Clair Region Conservation Authority (SCRCA) are planning for the 2024 season and are looking to engage landowners interested in implementing projects on their properties.

"Stewardship and tree planting initiatives provide many benefits for both the environment and the property in general", said Jessica Van Zwol, Healthy Watershed Specialist at the Authority. "We can assist landowners and provide both technical and financial support for a number of different projects.

The St. Clair Region watershed consists of over 80% agricultural land. Stewardship and tree planting projects implemented on farmland not only improve habitat for many plants and animals to thrive, including Species at Risk, but can also help reduce soil erosion, protect rural water quality, increase crop yields, and potentially reduce the amount of fertilizer needed to ensure a successful harvest. The Authority supports a variety of projects including wetland creation, tree planting, cover crops, erosion control structures, and planting riparian buffers.

"The success of our tree planting and stewardship program is really due to the commitment of landowners throughout our watershed," explained Jeff Sharp, SCRCA's Conservation Services Specialist, "Since 1980, we have planted over 4 million trees and created 100 hectares of wetland thanks to property owners taking on naturalization projects.'

Interested landowners are welcome to connect with Authority staff who can help manage projects from start to finish and answer questions related to funding sources and grants that are available to offset eligible project costs. Presently, funding is available through the SCRCA for several stewardship projects including the creation of

shallow wetlands, the planting of riparian buffers to separate agricultural fields from watercourses, the installation of erosion control berms and grassed waterways (see below) in farm fields to slow runoff, and the installation of fencing and alternative water sources to limit livestock accessibility to local waterways.

The St. Andrew's food bank is a safe harbour for families and individuals experiencing difficult circumstances. As food bank Christmas preparations were being made, volunteer Sharon LaPier had the idea to make some small tote bags with some fabric she already had, fill them with snacks like chips, apples and treats, and hand out one to each family. "The original idea was that the whole family could enjoy what was in the bag and have an evening with it," she said. After discussing the idea with others at the food bank, it

After discussing the idea with others at the food bank, it was decided a bag could be made for each child. The contents of the bag was also discussed, and Sharon said just filling it with junk food would not do. She suggested the bag should include a balance of some nutritional items along with some treats.

Another snag came up when the size of the goodie bag came into question. If fresh fruit, juice boxes, pudding cups and other nourishing items were to be used, they would take up considerable space, so a larger bag would be needed to accommodate it. Sharon reached out to several other small church groups to see if they would participate in a joint effort.

church groups to see if they would participate in a joint effort. After contacting several other church groups, Knox Moore's Ladies Aid group joined the St. Andrews Corunna group, and the scope of the project expanded. When the group discussed the project, it was decided the tote bags wouldn't be big enough to hold two-weeks worth of food. "Diane (a member of the expanded group) came up with the idea of a pillow case, so now they get a gift of a pillowcase and in them, we put the goodies in and tie it up with a ribbon," said Sharon.

The goal for creating the pillowcases was the next thing to be considered. "If the kids were using the food bank, they were probably accessing lunch programs," said Sharon. The group became concerned about how the children who depended on the school food programs would fare during the twoweek Christmas holiday.

Citing the student nutrition supplement programs like the one a Col. Cameron Public School," Sharon said, "The parents council provides breakfast for every child so everyone can take part." Her granddaughter, who attends Col. Camereron, told her the menu included such things as cereal with milk, juice, instant oatmeal, granola bars, fruit cups and yogurt. At lunch, items like fresh fruit and granola bars were available for students who hadn't had a sufficient meal.

Based on this information, the group began to hold sewing bees. "We decided to have a work party at Thompson Gardens, so we asked the ladies from St. Andrews Church and Knox Moore, and from Thompson Gardens and the Corunna Seniors Coffee Club, if anyone wanted to sew," said Sharon. "Some sewed, some pressed, and some cut, and we made 40 pillowcases." Another five were made and will be given to single people who come to the food bank.

Much of the fabric used for the project was donated by the women who worked on it. But the Knox Moore Ladies Aid group donated some funds as well. "The ladies from our Ladies Aid at Knox went out of their minds and set aside \$400, but they donated so much stuff we only spend \$100 and the rest was donated," said Sharon. The \$300 left over will be used by the food bank when the shelves need restocking. Surplus Christmas fabric was given to the Corunna Legion

Surplus Christmas fabric was given to the Corunna Legion Sew Girls, who made 20 more pillowcases for the Knox Moore Ladies Aid group. The Knox Moore group usually makes them at Christmas, fills them with necessities, and donates them to Lambton Developmental Services for clients who have no families. (See the Sew Girls in Action, page 13) The members of the Corunna Seniors Coffee Club donated money to the project, which was used to stock every pillowcase with a full-sized box of cereal from the Corunna Dollar store. When the manager found out about the project, a gift certificate was donated to the project and was used to buy hats, mitts and socks. Another member of the Coffee Club went to Costco and bought two cases of instant oatmeal so each pillowcase contains several packages of oatmeal.

Sharon says she was pleased that people from so many groups, including two church groups, came together to complete the project. "People think we don't work together, but we do," she said.


